

#### 4-H Year

September 1 to August 31

#### Age Requirements

Youth may participate in 4-H year from September 1st of grade three through August 31st following completion of grade twelve, with these age restrictions:

- Minimum age 8 (in addition to being in the 3rd grade)
- Maximum age 18 (as of August 31, 2018)

Texas 4-H Age Categories for project activity purposes are:

Junior = Grades 3, 4, and 5 Intermediate = Grades 6, 7 and 8 Senior = Grades 9-12

#### 4-H Council

Members of the Palo Pinto County 4-H Council plan and coordinate 4-H activities in the county. The County Council also promotes district and state level 4-H activities. It is comprised of 4-H members from each of the various 4-H clubs in the County. Clubs are encouraged to have two council delegates who will attend the County 4-H Council meetings. Typically, a 4-H member is elected into the position of council delegate and represents his or her club at the County 4-H Council meetings. In most cases, the president of the 4-H club also serves as a delegate to the County 4-H Council. In addition to the club council delegates and presidents, membership to the council is open to all 4-H youth.

The Palo Pinto County 4-H Council serves as a communication channel. Council delegates represent their club and relay information and ideas from their club to the council. The council delegates also relay information from the council to their club to keep the members up to date on county-wide activities and events.

#### Step 1 - Youth Complete Online or Paper Enrollment

#### **Enrollment Time**

On September 1st each year, all former, new 4-H members, and volunteer leaders must re-enroll for the current year. Enrollment stays current from September 1st through August 31st.

#### Enrolling in 4-H

To enroll in a Texas 4-H club, you must fill out an enrollment form and return it, with the \$20.00 fee to your club manager. Or you may register online using the 4-H Connect management system. You will need a computer, internet access, and a Mozilla web browser.



#### \*\*Returning Members

Just click "Login to 4-H Connect." Call the Extension office at 940-659-1228 to obtain a temporary password if you are having trouble logging in to your family profile.

- 1) Click the "EDIT" button beside each youth/adult profile, review all information for correct data, select projects, activities, and leadership roles and click ENROLL FOR 2018-2019.
- 2) THEN, you will go through each screen of the person you are enrolling. Please check and be sure the information is complete and click, continue, on each screen until you get to the last screen.
- 3) If you have reviewed everything and all is updated and correct, please click Submit Enrollment and then wait on our office to accept your enrollment.

#### \*\*New Members:

- 1. Open your Mozilla internet browser. If you do not have Mozilla, please download it free from www.mozilla.com.
- 2. Go to https://texas.4honline.com.
- 3. Click "I need to setup a profile."
- 4. Select your county from the drop down menu.
- 5. Fill in the fields marked Email, Confirm Email, and Last Name and create a password you will remember.
- 6. Select "Family" on the Role drop down menu.
- 7. Click "Create Login."
- 8. Follow the on-screen prompts to register your family and all family members involved in a 4-H club as a member or volunteer (including adults). Fields marked in bold are required.
- 9. Register each member in all projects or groups they participate in or wish to join in the future.
- 10. If you are a youth, your registration will be submitted to your county extension office, where an agent will review your application. If you have to make any corrections, they will contact you by e-mail. Once complete and correct, the agent will approve your enrollment.

#### Step 2 - Parents Complete Online or Paper Enrollment

10. If you are an adult volunteer, your registration will be sent to the Youth Protection Standards Office for screening if you have not been screened, or are due for your three year review. Once you are screened and approved, your registration will be returned back to your county extension office, where an agent will review and accept your application.

Step 3-4 - Attend Monthly 4-H Meetings & Get Involved



As a Member or Leader, you need to get involved in your local club; attend monthly meetings, volunteer for committees, and stay informed of what is going on in your club. 

#### Step 5 - Start a Project

On the 4-H Connect Enrollment pages or on the paper form, 4-H members are asked to select projects of interest to them. When you start your 4-H experience, you may want to select one or two projects. The more years you are in 4-H, the more projects you can usually handle. 4-H projects can be conducted throughout the 4-H year (September 1-August 31). Certain projects have special activities or contests, so you need to begin some projects at specific times during the year. After you select your projects, contact your Club Manager or County Extension office if you have any questions.

#### Step 6 - Complete a Project

After you have selected your project you are ready to start gaining information and having fun learning about your project. In 4-H, you are asked to do a minimum of six learning experiences to complete a project. Learning experiences will vary from project to project, such as meetings with other 4-H'ers and Leaders, going on tours, attending workshops or showmanship clinics, reading publications or surfing the Internet. Many 4-H'ers work on projects with their parents, grandparents or other family members, while other 4-H'ers work on projects with friends. Working through a project from start to finish helps a 4-H member gain skills in carrying out responsibilities, as well as setting and completing goals.

#### **Project Record Form**

On the following pages, you will find a Project Record Form. It is helpful to keep records of any income or expenses related to your project as well as any leadership roles you may have had in 4-H or outside of 4-H. Any volunteer activities should be recorded here too, even if they are not 4-H related. Keeping a good record of all 4-H activities and non-4-H activities will help you complete your Record Book that will be due in June. It is not required that every member complete a project record form or record book, however, it is recommended; especially if the member plans to apply for a 4-H Opportunity Scholarship if he/she is eligible as a senior member. #### Step 7 - Participate in Activities

Activities are contests or opportunities for 4-H members to demonstrate the skills and knowledge they have gained through their project work. Some of the activities allow a team of 4-H'ers to prepare a presentation, while other activities are for individual contest entry.

Participating in 4-H activities helps the member gain public speaking skills and presentation skills that will help them throughout their life. Other activities available to 4-H'ers are a variety of camps and workshops conducted mainly in the summer.

#### SCHOOL ABSENCES AND PARTICIPATION IN 4-H COMPETITIVE ACTIVITIES

4-H has been recognized by the Texas Education Agency as a legitimate school-related extracurricular organization. 4-H members may apply for excused absences in order to participate in 4-H activities. It is the responsibility of the local school district to determine whether or not any student is eligible and may be excused from classes to participate in any extracurricular event or activity. 4-H members are not automatically excused upon request, but are subject to all regulations of the Texas Education Agency and their local school district as they may apply to extracurricular participation.

#### Additional Information

- All animals that will be shown at the County Show are required to attend validation on the dates above or they will not be allowed to show.
- All exhibitors must be a regularly enrolled member of a 4-H and/or FFA member in Palo Pinto County to be eligible to show. That means that your dues have been paid for the current year, and you have active member status.
- Exhibitors who are validating their animals for Major Shows (Ft. Worth, San Antonio, Houston, San Angelo, or Austin) must have a parent or guardian at validation to sign paperwork. Also, ALL exhibitors who will be showing at a major show must re-do their Quality Counts Training with the updated system. #### Palo Pinto County Annual Awards Banquet

In addition to recognition at Palo Pinto County 4-H Contests, 4-H members are also recognized for their accomplishments at the annual Palo Pinto County 4-H Achievement Banquet held in the late summer. The applications for these awards are available in fillable form on our county website or you can call the Extension office & we can mail you an application. Throughout the year, members can work toward meeting the criteria outlined on the award applications, then, they must submit the application to the Extension office by the June deadline to be eligible for the award. The awards are briefly described here:

- 1) RECORD BOOK AWARDS Record Book awards are presented based on what 4-Hers report in their 4-H Record Book. Committees judge or evaluate project work and achievement, leadership, personal growth and development by reading the record books.
- 2) ROOKIE AWARDS A 4-H member who has completed his or her first year of membership, regardless of age, is eligible for the Rookie Award.
- 3) 4-H HONOR ROLL Available to Junior members, grades 3<sup>rd</sup> 5<sup>th</sup>, who meet the established criteria.
- 4) 4-H ALL STAR Available to Intermediate members, grades  $6^{th} 8^{th}$  who meet the established criteria.
- 5) 4-H LETTERMAN Available to Senior members, grades 9th 12th who meet the established criteria.
- \*\*\*These Criteria-based award applications are included in the back of the handbook.
- 6) I DARE YOU AWARD This award is offered as recognition of excellence in character, well-balanced personal development and demonstrated leadership. Palo Pinto County will give one award to a deserving, Senior age, 4-H Member.
- 7) GOLD STAR AWARD The Gold Star Award is the most sought-after 4-H award at the county level. It is awarded each year to two (2) outstanding, Senior 4-H members in Palo Pinto County who have submitted a complete record book. Youth will have to be a sophomore or higher to receive this award. Most youth who qualify may apply at the end of their freshman year. The award is given based on their activities and participation throughout their entire 4-H career.

#### Step 7 - Keep Records

When you spend time working on a project, you need to record or take notes and pictures to track what you learn through your progress. Palo Pinto County 4-H'ers have the chance to complete a <u>Record Book</u> for recognition at the Annual 4-H Awards Banquet, and to be considered for 4-H awards.

4-H Record Books are a great way for 4-Her's to keep records of their progress on their project! In constructing a 4-H

Record Book, members organize information about their participation and accomplishments in all 4-H projects and activities. Any project can be completed using a 4-H Record Book. Record books are judged at county, district, and state levels at the end of the project year.

#### Step 8 - Share Information

As a 4-H member, you learn to share with others the information you gain through your project experience.

#### Step 9 - Help Others

The 4-H experience includes helping others. We call our 4-H helping, Community Service. This is something that you do for a non-4-H audience without pay or compensation.
